WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR CAMP SERVICES?

A student is eligible for CAMP if they meet one of the following criteria:

- They or their parent(s) or guardian(s) have engaged in migrant or seasonal farm work for at least 75 days within the last 24 months.
- They have participated or been eligible to participate in the Title 1C Migrant Education Program.
- Has qualified for the Workforce Investment Act 167 Program (WIA 167), formerly the JTPA 402 Program High School Equivalency
 Program (HEP).
- Eligibility is determined at the federal level and is nationally uniform

2012-2013 CAMP COHORT SNAPSHOT

CAMP is funded to serve 60 students

- CAMP is currently serving 62 students
 - •41 Females and 21 Males
 - •1 commuter student, the remainder live on campus or in town
 - 99% Latino/a background
 - •99% first generation
 - 100% of students receive financial aid
 - ■100% of students full-time status at CWU




Custom email cards have been created for Admissions Counselors. They are used to send a personalized invitation to a register for an event or to respond to a student's inquiry.


