

Statutory Charge to Propose Attainment Goals

Propose to the Governor and the Legislature:

- Goals for increasing educational attainment in Washington, recommend the resources necessary to achieve the goals, and monitor progress towards meeting the goals.
- Improvements and innovations needed to continually adapt the state's educational institutions to evolving education attainment needs.


Advocate for higher education and educate the public on the economic, social, and civic benefits of postsecondary education.

Connect the work of K-12 and postsecondary programs, institutions, agencies, and stakeholders.

Take a lead role in facilitating research and analysis related to educational attainment.

The Roadmap and the Strategic Action Plan

Aligned with the biennial budget and policy cycles, the Council updates the Roadmap in odd numbered years and creates a short-term strategic action plan in even-numbered years to identify strategies and priorities for meeting the state's attainment goals (RCW 28B.77.020).



Annual Roadmap and Planning Work



Proposed Timeline

Council Meeting	Action to Develop Roadmap Update
February 11	Council discusses 2016 Roadmap and provides direction to staff on contents and process
April 8	Staff provide update to Council
June 10	Council assesses legislative direction for any changes to process and contents
August 13	Staff provide update to Council
October 15	Draft Roadmap Update presented to the Council for final input
November 18	Final Roadmap update approved for dissemination

Attainment goals & traditional students

By 2023:

All adults ages 25-44 in Washington will have a high school diploma or equivalent.

At least 70% of adults ages 25-44 in Washington will have a postsecondary credential.




Traditional student attainment trajectory:

Underrepresented Students

Race/ethnicity, gender, special populations, low-income

Attainment goals and returning adult students

- Returning adults
- Students/adults who have earned credits but not completed a credential.



Non-traditional students and populations need to contribute to attainment goals.

Council Questions and Answers (February 11)

- Approach and focus Does this approach make sense? Yes, focus on progress metrics. Include or add 'leading indicators' that relate to outcomes on the core measures (HS graduation, PS enrollment and PS completion)
- 2. Technical work group Who should serve on the group to review feasibility, quality, and availability of information? **Start with WSAC Agency Partners**
- 3. Involvement How does the Council wish to advise/monitor this work? **Regular** updates/discussion at council meetings and committees.
- 4. Roadmap progress report Composition and timeline. Include metrics but also updates on other Roadmap-related work.

For all measures:

- Collect and review readily-available measures (agencies, ERDC, Results WA, etc.).
- Build on the core 2013 Roadmap measures.
- Consult with agency technical experts on feasibility and verification.

Roadmap Thematic Categories and Demographic Factors



Leading Indicators, Core Measures, Progress Metrics

Leading indicators are associated with outcomes on core measures.

Core measures HS Completion PS Enrollment PS Completion

Progress metrics enable comparisons between years, i.e. diplomas, enrollments or degrees awarded.

High School Completion: Potential Leading Indicators

Secondary academic achievement

- GPA (esp. 9th grade)
- High school test scores/assessments (esp. Math & English)
- Grade-level progression (esp. 9 to 10th grade)

Behavioral

- Attendance
- Disciplinary behavior, suspensions, expulsions
- Transfers between schools (mobility)

High School Completion: Progress Metrics

Graduation Rates

• 4-year, 5-year

Number of alternate diplomas

 High School Equiv. (HSEs) via state centers and SBCTC

Postsecondary Enrollments: Primary Sources

Traditional students

- High school completers
- Underrepresented students
 - Race/Ethnicity
 - Gender
 - Special populations
- Low income

Adult students

- Current and Returning
- Military, job/career changers, etc.
- Career transition/skill upgrade

Postsecondary Enrollment: Potential Leading Indicators

Readiness

- High school test scores, assessments
- SBAC scores (when available)
- Specific course completion
- SAT/ACT statewide exam participation and scores

Access

- Dual credit participation
- Time between HS graduation and PS enrollment
- Postsecondary acceptance rates

Financial Support

- FAFSA completion
- Financial aid awards

Postsecondary Enrollment: Progress Metrics

Enrollments by level

- Certificates,
- Apprenticeships
- 2yr, 4yr, graduate/professional program)

Postsecondary Completion: Potential Leading Indicators

Success, persistence

- Success in pre-college (remedial) education courses
- Success in first-year college courses
- Credit accumulation
- Retention rates (persistence)
- Course completion
- GPA

Financial Support

- Financial aid awards (CBS/SNG/Pell, others?)
- FAFSA application *renewal* completed, submitted

Postsecondary Completion: Progress Metrics

Credentials awarded

- Certificates
- Apprenticeships
- 2yr, 4-yr, grad degrees

Graduation rates

Transfer

- 2-yr to 4-yr
- DTA and non-DTA

Time and credits to degree

Participation and Attainment: Core Measures

Participation Progress Metrics

- Postsecondary participation:
 - % of Washingtonians enrolled in a PS program, by level/type
 - Participation rate among those who do not have a credential

Attainment Progress Metrics

- High school attainment rate (diploma or HSE)
- Postsecondary attainment rate, by level/type
