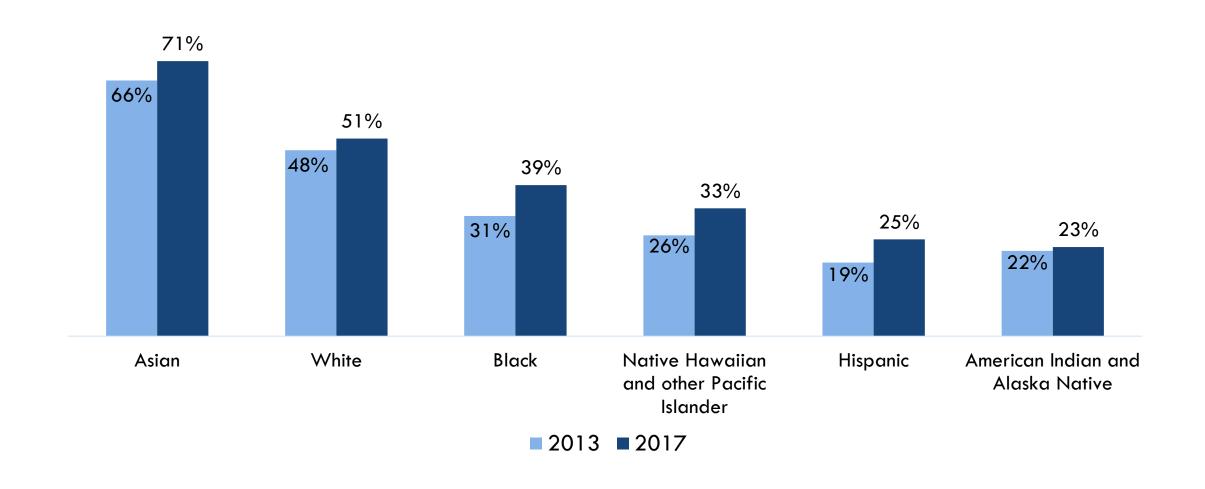




Attainment progress by subgroup

Affordability

Strong support for WSAC's role in higher education affordability advocacy and financial aid administration

Near unanimous mention by WSAC board as most impactful issue area

WSAC's advocacy for the Washington College Promise... can change the life of a student. This grant also provides an opportunity for DACA recipients to continue their studies by taking away the burden of financial instability.

Roadmap Goals and Strategy

70% attainment goal created a unifying target for Washington's education system

Strategic plans outlined key actions to achieve those goals

With the adoption of the state goal of 70% credential attainment, the Ready, Set, Grad! and 12th Year Campaign have added the most value.

Research on student enrollment and demographics as additional enabler for Washington's education system

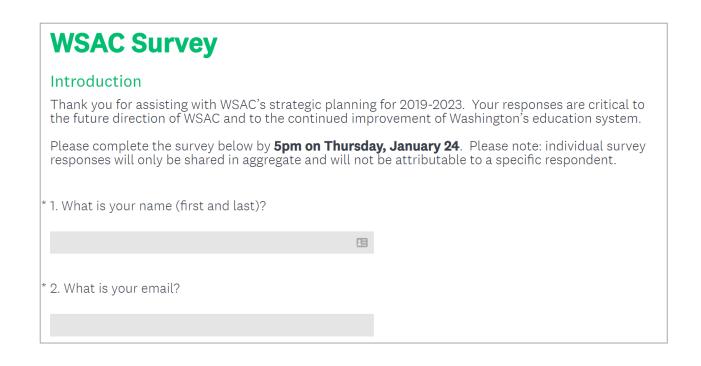

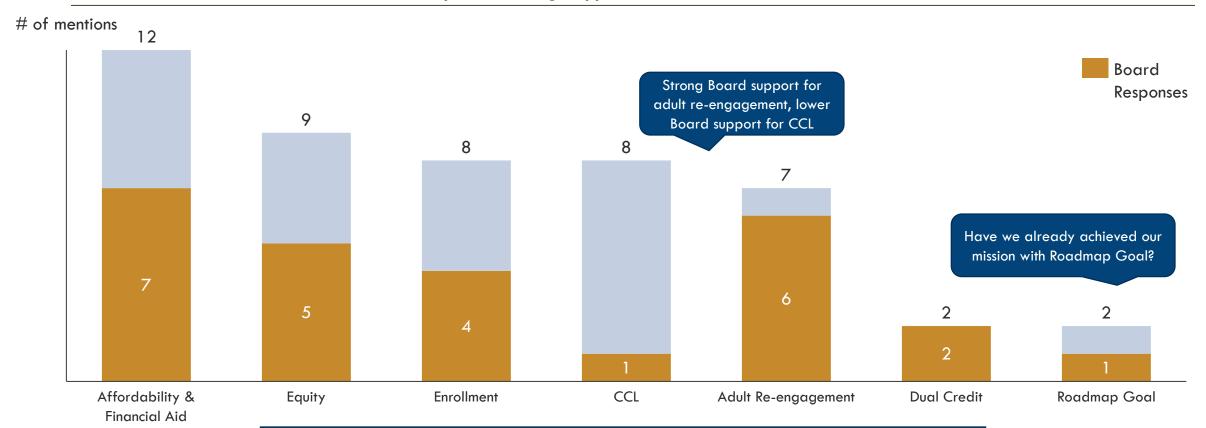

What are the most important strategic opportunities WSAC should focus on for 2019-2023?



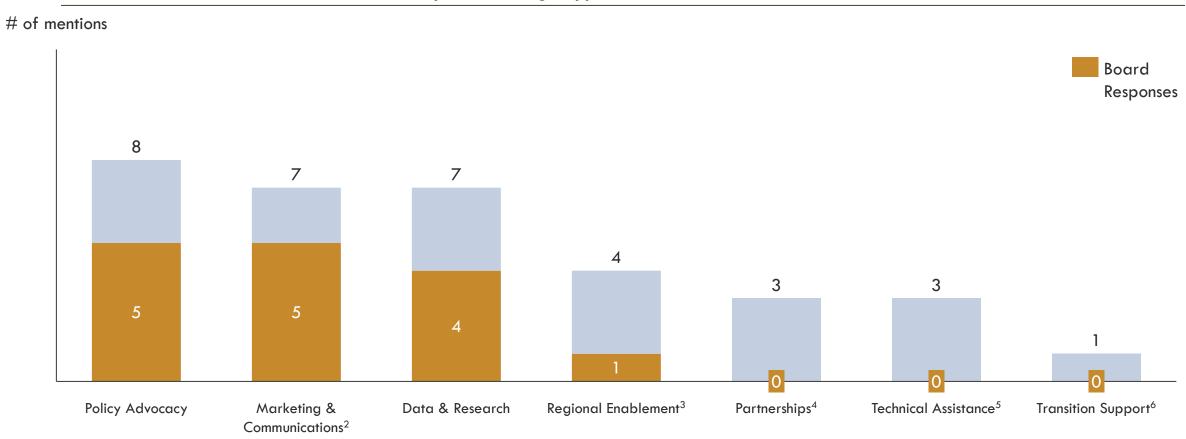
Results suggest increasing support for equity, CCL, and adult re-engagement

PRIORITY TACTICS 19-23: BROAD AGREEMENT ON WSAC TACTICS

What are the most important strategic opportunities WSAC should focus on for 2019-2023?



^{1.} Responses combine results from two questions. The first asked about strategic priorities for the entire education system, the second asked about priorities given respondent's specific role or interest within the education system. Kinetic West analyzed responses and summarized instances where respondents suggested tactics or methods to address specific opportunities, 2. Marketing and awareness building for students and families regarding postsecondary education, 3. Stakeholder development, alignment, and capacity building in regions, 4. Partnerships with agencies, CBOs, and higher education organizations, 5. Assistance for students to complete financial aid applications or supports for CBOs providing direct services for financial aid, 6. Support for students transitioning from K-12 to higher education

WSAC is a leader in financial aid for low-income students.

Supporting efforts to enact the Washington College

Promise Scholarship

Promote data access and agreements for partners offering direct services in Higher Education

Scale... impactful services and supports promoting college access and degree attainment

Address the gaps (Consider facilitating groups in different communities across the state to determine best approaches)

Social-emotional learning

Equity and diversity should be front and center. Follow the lead of CA and TN to connect students with state-level social service programs

Work with multiple agencies to continue to expand dual credit
opportunities for high school students.
This work has stalled after tremendous gains in 2013-15.



Additional commentary for WSAC strategic planning

What else should we consider as we continue planning for 2019-2023? Is there anything else you want to share?

Derive a small number of key priorities (3-5) for the Council to focus on over the next 5 years, then organize into subgroups to work on these issues with staff and report back. This enables WSAC members to see themselves in the work. Also communicate that to policymakers and other state leaders

Keep legislators and Governor's office involved

Continue engaging the expertise and experience of Council members in setting and advancing the agency's strategic direction

Take a more active advocacy role in ensuring ALL high school students complete a rigorous course of study and hold K-12 system accountable for delivering that course of study to all students
